



ASCA's Parent Pandemic Pulse Survey, conducted mid October to mid November of 2020, sought to capture the experiences and perceptions of parents of K-12 students during the first few weeks of the 2020-2021 'back to school in a pandemic' reality.

Designed with the guidance of research experts Phil McRae and Lisa Everitt from the Alberta Teachers' Association (ATA), and utilizing the ATA's survey mechanism, the Parent Pandemic Pulse survey asked many of the same questions that had been asked of the ATA's members...Alberta's teachers. In designing their survey, the ATA used guidance from a World Health Organization (WHO) insight research survey tool and a Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) measurement scale. ASCA maintained that consistency and integrity for this survey.

ASCA believed then, as we believe now, that there is great value in being able to compare the responses of parents (some of whom are teachers) to the responses of teachers (some of whom are parents) when it comes to their confidence in the safety measures implemented for Alberta's students and school staff, or their concerns for their students' and families health and wellbeing.

The survey itself generated responses from just over 30,000 individuals, with a solid 21,000 completing it to form this report. ASCA promised privacy and anonymity to the respondents of the survey, and published the 46-page report without inclusion of the additional 428 pages of comments. The ASCA Board of Directors has utilized the data from this report to relay the parental experiences of 'school re-entry' to Alberta's Education Ministry, partners and stakeholders, and will continue to do so for as long as it is relevant.

Parents voices in education are vital. ASCA believes that parents have a right be to be recognized and respected as knowledgeable, supportive contributors to their children's education, and should be provided a variety of opportunities to be authentically engaged in all levels of the education system. This survey was one opportunity; an opportunity – we hope – that will provide cause for further exploration of the experiences and perceptions of parents.

Five, ten, even fifteen years from now, when the Covid-19 pandemic becomes an historical reference in a Social Studies curriculum, it is hoped that the children learning that curriculum will reflect on their memories through the pandemic, and know – because of this survey and the many others that have taken, or will take place, that their parents, teachers and leaders cared enough about what they were experiencing, to ask, and/or answer, questions designed to inform decisions, set directions and to truly understand their lived realities as a K-12 student during Covid-19.

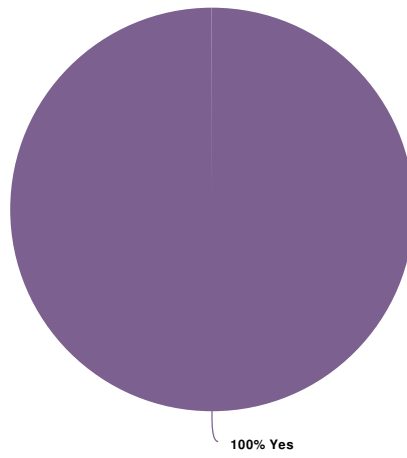


Research Limitations

While the findings from this Alberta School Councils Association (ASCA) survey may be helpful in providing insight into parents' perspectives during Alberta school re-entry in the Fall of 2020, some of the specific comments may not be applicable to other contexts. The large size of the survey sample was more than adequate for identifying common themes and key findings. However, because most of the respondents were self-selected, and there is some imbalance in regional participation, it is difficult to determine with complete certainty that the results are representative of the larger population of parents and guardians with children in kindergarten to grade 12 in Alberta.

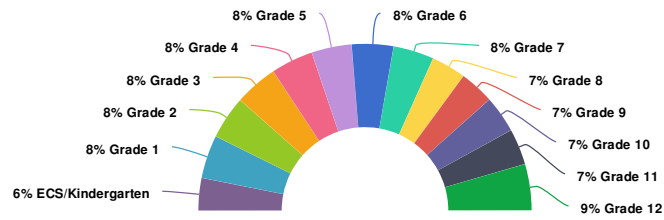
The fact that the responses from this survey show similar patterns to a prior survey created using a research instrument designed by the Alberta Teachers' Association (who used guidance from a World Health Organization (WHO) insight research survey tool and a Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) measurement scale) does increase confidence in the representativeness of the results. As is often the case with exploratory research, new questions emerged that might become the focus of future research. The results of this research survey will be further analyzed and weighted for representation, and may be of use for the historical record of the impact of the coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) on Alberta.

1. Do you have children in Alberta's kindergarten to grade 12 (K-12) schools?



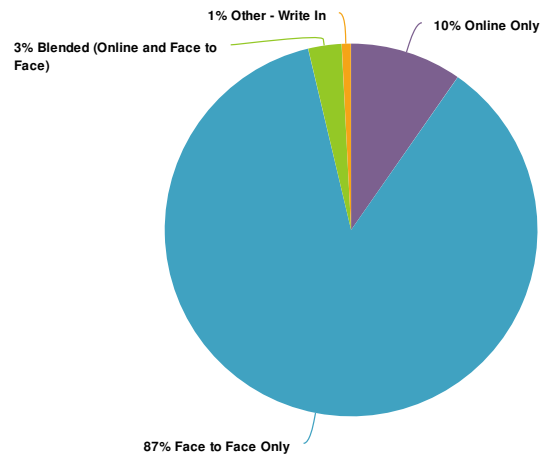

2. For this survey, think of one child in your family and answer all questions based on this child's experience with re-entry. Please identify this child's grade level?



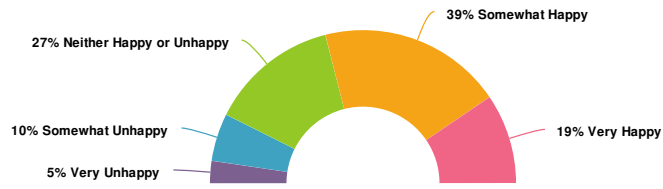

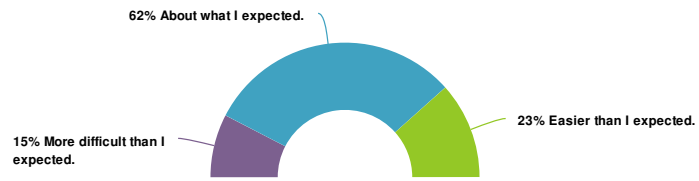
4. How are you feeling?

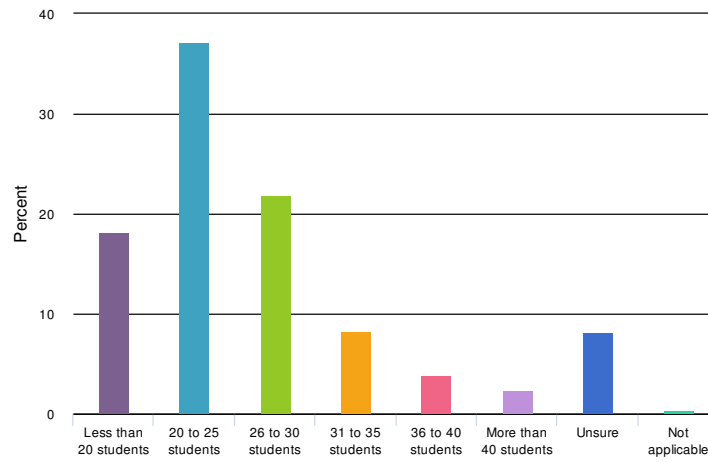

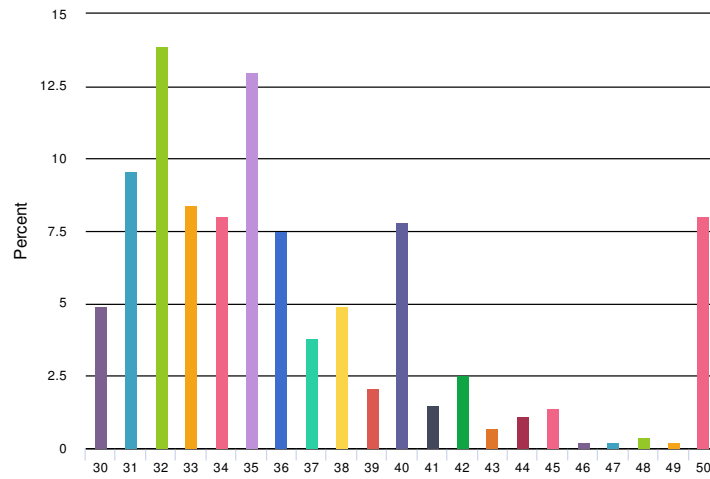
8. The size of the largest class that your child/children are currently in (online or face to face)?

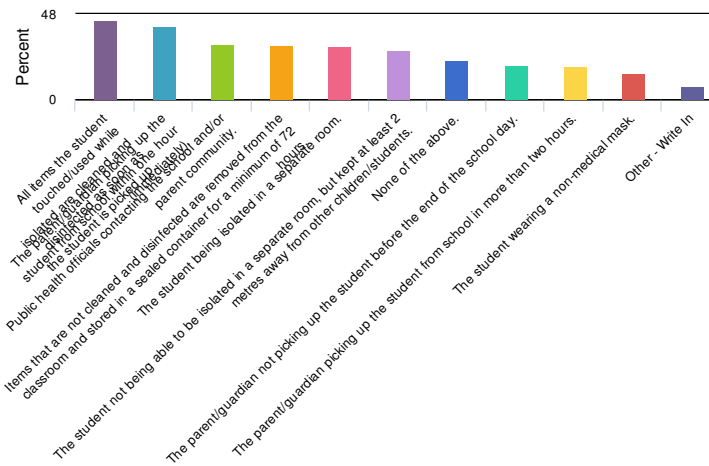

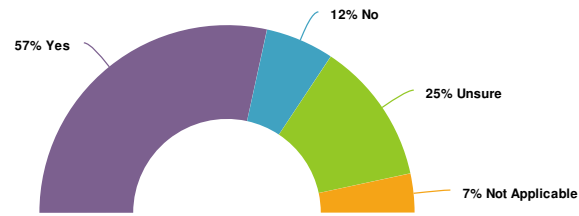

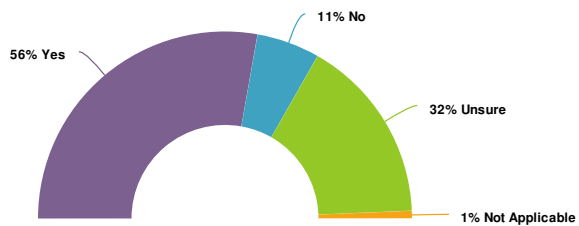

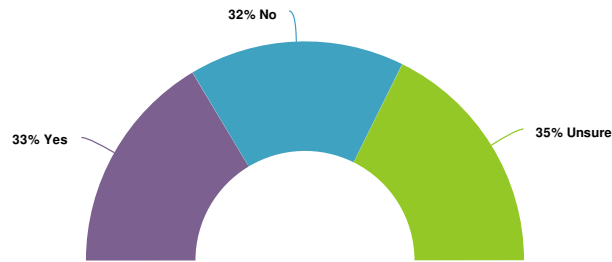

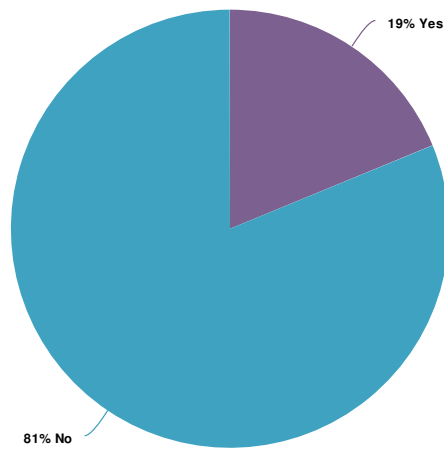

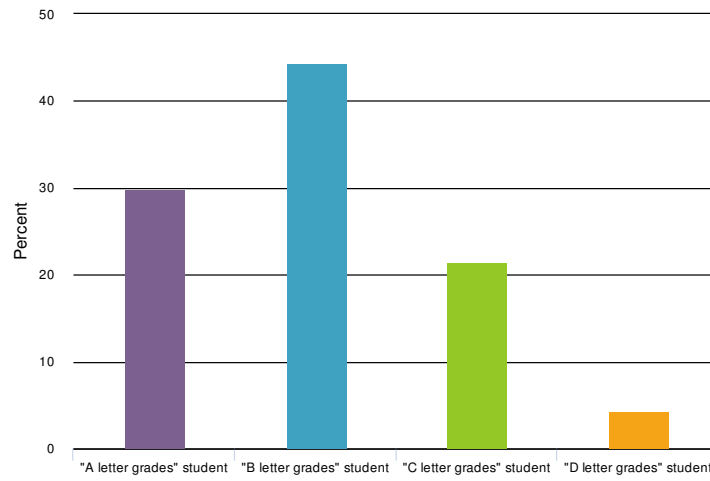

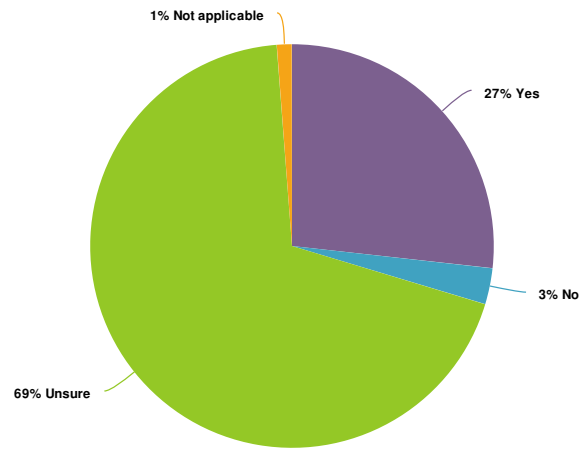
25. In general, how would you estimate the overall academic performance (A, B, C or D letter grades) of your child who is going to a private tutor or receiving outside educational services/support(s)?

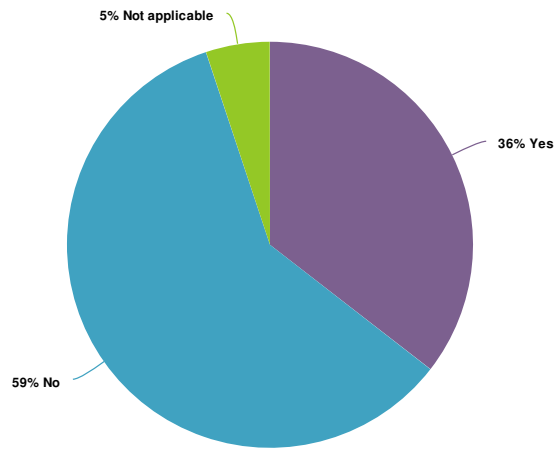

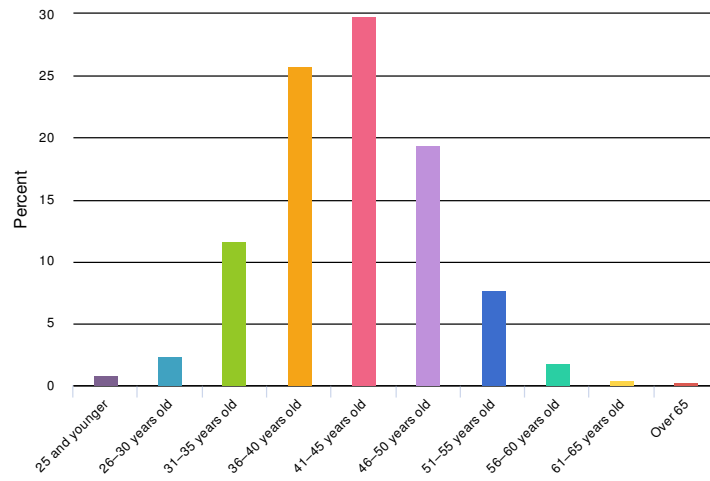
29. How do you identify?

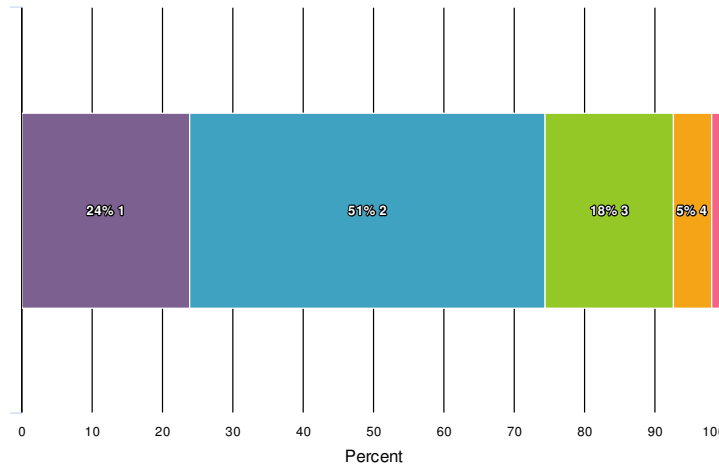

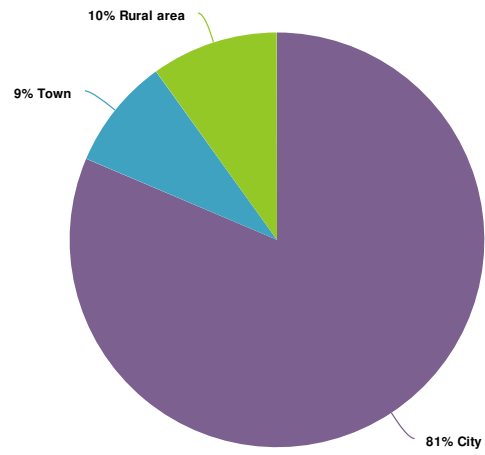
31. Number of children in your household

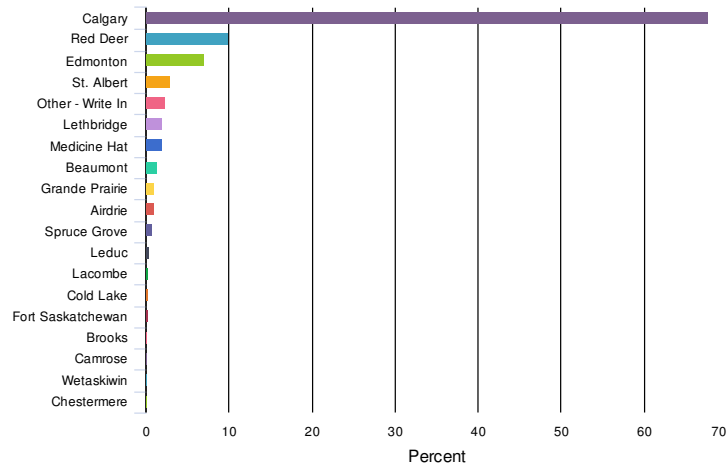
32. Do you live in an Alberta city, town or rural area?

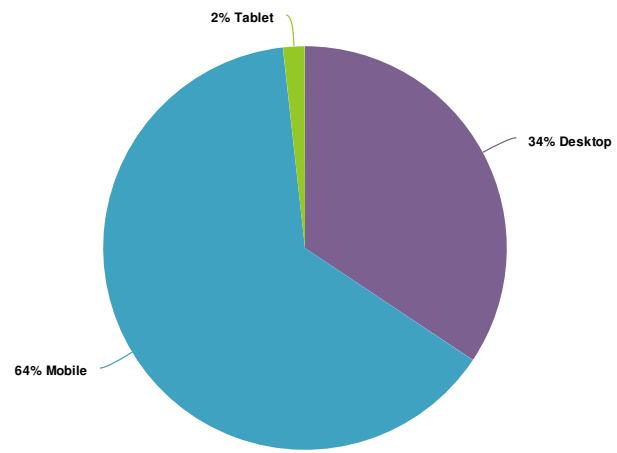

Research Limitations

Research Limitations

While the findings from this Alberta School Councils Association (ASCA) survey may be helpful in providing insight into parents' perspectives during Alberta school re-entry in the Fall of 2020, some of the specific comments may not be applicable to other contexts. The large size of the survey sample was more than adequate for identifying common themes and key findings. However, because most of the respondents were self-selected, and there is some imbalance in regional participation, it is difficult to determine with complete certainty that the results are representative of the larger population of parents and guardians with children in kindergarten to grade 12 in Alberta.

The fact that the responses from this survey show similar patterns to a prior survey created using a research instrument designed by the Alberta Teachers' Association (who used guidance from a World Health Organization (WHO) insight research survey tool and a Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) measurement scale) does increase confidence in the representativeness of the results. As is often the case with exploratory research, new questions emerged that might become the focus of future research. The results of this research survey will be further analyzed and weighted for representation, and may be of use for the historical record of the impact of the coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2) on Alberta.
